# Letter from the CEO

Dear Friends of Orangewood Foundation,

This past year has been one of incredible growth and impact at Orangewood Foundation. Together, we celebrated accomplishments that reflect both the strength of our team and the resilience of the young people we serve. From being recognized as one of Orange County's *Best Places to Work*, to opening our newest housing site Hope's Corner, to expanding partnerships that provide safe shelter and opportunities, we are proud of the progress we've made as a community.

These achievements are more than markers of success. They are a foundation for what comes next. They demonstrate what is possible when we come together, and they set the stage for the even greater work that lies ahead. As the needs of Orange County's young people continue to grow, we will rise to meet them with bold ambition and a clear plan.

That is why our 2025–2029 Strategic Plan is so critical. At its heart is a commitment to ensure that every young person in our community has a safe place to call home. The housing crisis for young adults, especially those transitioning from foster care or experiencing homelessness, has reached a breaking point. Between 2022 and 2024, the number of unhoused young adults in Orange County grew by 31%. Yet, only 1.4% of the county's housing is designated for this age group, leaving hundreds without safe, stable shelter. Without housing, every other goal like education, employment, health, independence, becomes nearly impossible.

We cannot wait for others to act. Orangewood Foundation must be bold and assertive to create new opportunities for Orange County's most vulnerable young people. Building on the momentum of this past year, Orangewood will lead the way on housing expansion through new partnerships, innovative solutions, and increased supportive services. But housing is only the beginning. We will also strengthen our role as a thought leader, an advocate, and an employer of choice, ensuring that young people have the resources and champions they deserve.

With your continued support, Orangewood Foundation will move forward with courage and compassion—because every young person deserves a safe home, a supportive community, and a future filled with possibility.


# 2025 Year in Highlights


This year, Orangewood Foundation took bold steps to expand housing, deepen partnerships, and celebrate milestones for the young people we serve. Thanks to our dedicated staff, generous supporters, and strong community partners, more young adults are finding stability, opportunity, and hope.

# Recognized as One of Orange County's Best Places to Work

We are proud to be named one of the 2025 Best Places to Work in Orange County, ranking 27th among mid-sized companies and the highest-ranked nonprofit!

This recognition—based on feedback from our own employees—reflects the supportive, mission-driven culture our team has built together. At Orangewood, we want all of our team members to feel valued, empowered, and inspired to make a difference.





## **Expanding Housing Opportunities**

- Hope's Corner Transitional Housing This new housing program, in collaboration with Pathways of Hope, provides safe, stable housing for marginalized young people in Orange County.
- Illumination Health + Home Partnership By utilizing vacant IH+H recuperative beds as emergency shelter beds for Orangewood young adults, we are able to reduce the number of young people that do not have a safe, secure place to sleep at night.
- South County Outreach Collaboration Together, we are preventing homelessness among college students by providing transitional housing in South Orange County.
- HUD Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) Vouchers Orangewood Foundation is serving 122 young adults that have these valuable HUD vouchers. Our FYI voucher placement rate is outstanding, making our Orange County collaboration the most successful program in the entire country. Another 25–50 vouchers will be added this summer, helping even more young adults find stability.



#### Milestones in Education

- Youth Connected Program and Samueli Academy Graduates Three students—our first to spend all four years in the Youth Connected Program—graduated this year and are headed to college!
- More young people receiving scholarships \$711,011 in scholarships was awarded to 253 undergraduate students and 20 students pursuing their graduate degree, a doctorate, or a certification.

## The Fight Against Trafficking

- **Project Choice** Our drop-in center supported 294 young people experiencing or at-risk of human trafficking a 17% increase in participants from last year.
- Fullerton School District Partnership Orangewood now provides human trafficking education and training for school staff, helping identify and protect students at risk.



#### **Building Life Skills**

• Foster Youth Enrichment Fund – After a successful first year administering this \$1.2 million fund, the County extended this benefit through 2026. Foster youth now have access to life-changing enrichment activities—from music and sports to summer camps and family excursions—that build confidence, skills, and healing.





# Preparing Young Adults for the Workforce

Our General William Lyon Workforce
 Academy Program (LWA) continues
 to grow. 21 of our LWA partners hired
 45 young adults into entry-level jobs
 with sustainable career paths.
 Through mentorship, job readiness,
 and real-world experience, young
 people are gaining the skills they need

#### **Housing Expansion**

Safe housing is the foundation for every other success. We will:

- Increase housing units for young people experiencing homelessness by 250%
- Build more partnerships with affordable housing providers and developers.
- Expand supportive services to help young adults live independently.

More young people will have a safe, stable place to call home.

#### **Community Thought Leader**

Collaboration drives solutions. We will:

- Incorporate youth voice into all program design.
- Lead trainings and forums to educate the community on challenges and solutions.
- **Grow a network** of nonprofit and community partners.

Orangewood will be a trusted leader, fostering innovation and shared responsibility for young people.

#### **Advocacy**

Lasting change begins with policy. We will:

- **Engage policymakers** and influencers on housing, education, and employment.
- Strengthen relationships with legislators and public officials
- Advocate for increased support services and funding for young adults
